Situation tense but under control in Jiribam: Police

Miscrants torched two police outposts and at least 70 houses in a fresh bout of violence in Manipur

IMPHAL, June 9: The situation in Manipur's Jiribam district remained "tense" but "under control" on Sunday, after suspected militants torched two police outposts and at least 70 houses in a fresh bout of violence in the State, police said.

Additional security forces have been deployed in the affected areas following the incident on Saturday, they said. "The situation is tense but under control in the wake of violent disturbances that broke out in Jiribam district in which miscrants torched two police pickets, a forest beat office... And several houses belonging to both Meitei and Kuki communities," the Manipur Police said in a statement.

More than 70 houses were set on fire in Lamtai Khunou, Dibong Khunou, Nunkhal and Begra Villages, a senior police officer said.

"Police is also actively monitoring social media updates, which may incite communal feelings between the communities and requests general public to refrain from spreading unfounded/unverified information," it said.

Violence broke out in Jiribam in the ethnic strife-torn State on Thursday evening, after suspected militants killed a 59-year-old man. The person, identified as

Soibam Saratikumar Singh, was missing after he had gone to his farm on June 6 and later, his body was found with wounds inflicted by a sharp object, an official had said.

Meanwhile, an irate mob stopped a truck at Sorok Atangbi Khunou late on Saturday and reportedly torched essential commodities it was carrying, a police officer said.

A contingent of more than 70 State police commandos was airlifted from Imphal to Jiribam to assist security personnel in their operations against militants, he said.

Around 239 Meitei people, mostly women and children, have been evacuated from peripheral areas of Jiribam on Friday, and moved to a newly set relief camp at a multi-sports complex in the district, officials added.

The State government has transferred Jiribam SP A Ghanashyam Sharma and a Ghanashyam Sharma as the Additional Director of the Manipur Police Training College, according to an order issued by the Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms.

The transfer order was issued hours after police outposts of Jirij Mukh and Choto Bekra, and the Gokhal forest beat office were set afire on Saturday morning, they said. — PTI

Bodies of two Meghalaya coal miners retrieved

SHILLONG, June 9: The bodies of two coal miners from Ri-Bhoi district of Meghalaya, who died in a mistap in a coal mine in Assam's Tinsukia district, will be brought back to their respective villages.

The two bodies were retrieved from the rat-hole mine on Saturday.

The relatives of the deceased, identified as John Nonung (50) and Phincelin Unshuh (35), said today that the post-mortem examination and other formalities are being conducted after which the bodies would be brought back to their native places in Ri-Bhoi district.

"We have made all the arrangements, including the coffins, and are waiting for the formalities to be over," one of the relatives said over the phone. The two coal miners used to frequently go to Assam to work in coal mines for the past one and a half years. However, on May 26, they got trapped inside a mine after it caved in due to a landslide.

Bridge bombing halts Mizoram's imports from Myanmar

AIZAWL, June 9: The import of various commodities, including edibles and electronic gadgets, from Tahan town in Kalaymido district of Myanmar's Sagaing division to Mizoram has been halted due to the destruction of a bridge by the Myanmar army on Saturday.

Reports on Sunday confirmed that Myanmar army personnel attacked and demolished the suspension bridge over the Run river in the Tedium township area using explosives on Saturday morning.

The destruction of the bridge has disrupted road connectivity between Mizoram and Tahan town via Tedium and Zokhawthar in Champhai district. This disruption has halted all business activities as even pedestrian movement has become impossible, let alone passage of vehicles.

"No commodities have arrived here since Saturday due to the bombing of the Run river bridge," a resident of Champhai said on Sunday. He, however, expressed hope that the import of goods from Myanmar would resume soon via Falam, which is a much longer and challenging route.

Rajiv Gandhi's statue vandalised in Tripura

AGARTALA, June 9: A statue of former Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi was found vandalised in Tripura's Unakoti district, a Congress MLA said on Sunday.

Congress legislator Biprajit Sinha alleged that BJP-backed goons were behind the vandalism of the three-foot statue of Gandhi, which was laid on a concrete structure in Kailashahar subdivision in Kailashahar area in 2009 as a mark of respect to the former PM.

"The statue of ex-Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi was found vandalised on Sunday morning. I suspect that the statue was vandalised by a few BJP-backed goons," Sinha told reporters. The legislator demanded the arrest of those involved in the vandalism of the statue.

Sinha also claimed that some miscrants vandalised a CPI(M) party office in Srirampur in the Kailashahar Police Station area soon after the announcement of the Lok Sabha election results. A statue of Himadri Deb, a renowned cultural activist, was damaged by miscrants on Friday in Kozengram under the Kailashahar Police Station limits. "These are cowardly acts. I vehemently condemned such acts," he added. — PTI

Bangladeshi smuggler shot dead by BSF

AGARTALA, June 9: BSF troops shot dead a Bangladeshi smuggler near the Kalamcherra border outpost (BOP) in Sonamur subdivision of Sipahajala district in Tripura and attempted to smuggle a huge quantity of sugar to the neighbouring country, official sources said on Sunday.

A BSF jawan, who was guarding the border on Saturday morning, spotted a group of smugglers armed with sharp-edged weapons on either side of the border fencing, trying to smuggle sugar across the international border.

"When challenged, the smugglers did not pay any heed and turned aggressive. They tried to encircle the on-duty BSF jawan with the intent of assaulting him and snatching his service weapon. Use of non-lethal weapons further emboldened the smugglers and they continued with their aggressive

Three die while cleaning well in Tripura

AGARTALA, June 9: Three labourers met a tragic death in Tripura's Sepahijala district after they inhaled "toxic gas" that emanated from a ring well while cleaning it, police said on Sunday.

The incident happened on the premises of West Neoramura School in Sonamur subdivision of the district.

The school authority had engaged the labourers to clean the well, which was lying unused for a long time. "At first, one labourer had gone down to clean the well, but when he did not respond, two others also went inside it... Later, they were found unconscious in the well," SDPO (Sonamura) Sashi Mohan Debbarma said.

Panic-stricken locals called fire brigade personnel who took the three labourers to a nearby hospital, where they were declared dead on arrival, he said.

Newly elected Manipur MPs meet Rahul

IMPHAL, June 9: The two newly elected Congress MPs from Manipur, Prof Angomcha Bimol Akojiam and Alfred Kangam S Arthur, met AICC leaders Rahul Gandhi and Sonia Gandhi in New Delhi on Saturday.

The introductory meeting took place on the sidelines of the Congress Working Committee (CWC) meet in the national capital.

Kerisham Meghachandra and Congress Legislator Party leader and former Chief Minister Okram Ibobi Singh also attended the CWC meeting.

In the meeting, the MPCC president proposed the name of Rahul Gandhi as the Leader of Opposition. He also raised the issue of ongoing ethnic violence in Manipur and expressed concern over the situation.

He also sought the support of the party's central leadership to bring about a solution at the earliest.

Praising the serious commitment of Rahul Gandhi towards ensuring peace and harmony in the State, MPCC president Meghachandra appreciated his Bharat Jodo Nyay Yatra that started from Manipur's Thoubal and helped the party win both the Lok Sabha seats in Manipur.

He also highlighted a report on the fresh violence that erupted in Jiribam district of the State on June 6.

Concerning control and reduction of drugs and narcotics, he added. He said that the whole purpose of the meeting is to have enough manpower starting from the locality level to assist the police in their efforts to combat the drug menace and that will happen only with support of the community.

"I have been advocating a community-oriented approach and today the participation of so many dorbar shinghs is a proof that they have faith in what we are trying to achieve and I am very happy with the outcome of the meeting," Lyngdoh stated.

VDPs to combat drug menace in Meghalaya

Dorbar shinghs asked to submit suggestions for the proposed amendment of the Meghalaya Village Defence Organisation Rules, 2008

SHILLONG, June 9: Over 60 'dorbar shinghs' of the greater Shillong area have unanimously agreed to constitute village defence parties (VDPs) to assist the State government in its fight against drug menace in Meghalaya.

The dorbar shinghs have also been asked by the government to submit their suggestions for the proposed amendment of the Meghalaya Village Defence Organisation Rules, 2008 within a month.

The decision was taken at a consultative meeting chaired by Social Welfare

Minister Paul Lyngdoh on anti-drug initiatives and constitution of the VDPs with the MLAs, Members of District Councils (MDCs) and the dorbar shinghs of the greater Shillong area at the State Convention Centre here a couple of days ago.

Addressing the media, Lyngdoh said, "The first initiative that the stakeholders have agreed upon is the reconstitution of VDPs, which have been active in the rural areas. But in the context of controlling drug menace and the spread of narcotic substances, we have decided that various dorbar shinghs would constitute the VDPs."

"To begin with we have to start by revisiting the relevant rules that were framed in 2008. We certainly need to update those rules in view of the new challenges. So, we have taken the inputs from the dorbars and indicated a timeline of three weeks to a month within which they will submit their proposals for the amendment of the rules," he added.

Lyngdoh said that once these amendments are agreed upon, the dorbar shinghs would start the process of constituting the VDPs, which will assist the government in combating the drug menace at the locality and grassroots levels.

The minister said, "We will be revisiting the rules. We will ensure that the VDPs become the foot soldiers of the law enforcement agencies and together they will identify the drug hotspots and traffickers. With their support, we should be able to eradicate the menace from Meghalaya."

"We will be receiving suggestions from the dorbar shinghs and we will familiarise them with the basic amenities, facilities and training that is required. We will also familiarise them with the basic rules that govern the functioning of VDPs and also the laws of the land
